Resume and Cover Letter Tools

A **resume** is a summary of your strengths, skills, education, and work experience. Most employers will ask you to submit a resume with your job application.

A **cover letter** is a statement- no longer than 1 page in length- about why you're interested in the job you are applying for. It is also an opportunity to highlight anything from your resume that will make you stand out as a candidate for that job.



Job Application Information

A **job application** is an online form or paper you fill out when you want to get a job. It helps the person who is hiring learn more about you.

How do I get started?

Most job applications ask for similar information. So, if you are applying to more than one job, it can be helpful to add your information to a template so that it can be quickly copied & pasted to different application sites.

After applying, consider visiting job sites to introduce yourself in person or provide a hard copy of your resume. If you haven't heard from a job a few weeks after applying, you can call to check on the status of your application.





Interview Preparation Guide

A **job interview** is a meeting between someone who wants a job (**the job candidate**) and a person from the company looking to hire. During the interview, the company asks questions to learn about the candidate's skills, experience, and fit for the job. Use this guide to assist to **prepare your answers** for common interview questions. Then, practice your answers with a mentor or coach!


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
Write down what you would say in the box above! See your Work Strengths and Skills Inventory for ideas.






Interview Prep and Checklist

Getting a paid job may affect your benefits (like health insurance coverage or monthly income you receive from the government). However, this does not mean people with disabilities can't work! It's important to seek benefits counseling when making decisions related to employment– such as the number of hours/week you work.
