




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Career Exploration



- Identify interests, skills, and potential career paths: (<https://www.lifecourselibrary.com/employment/>).
- Utilize career counseling services, job shadowing, and informational interviews through Pre-ETS services: (<https://www.ncdhhs.gov/divisions/employment-and-independence-people-disabilities/jobseeker-services/youth-and-student-services>).
- Use resources like O*NET (www.onetonline.org), NCWorks Career Centers (www.ncworks.gov), and NCCareers (<https://nccareers.org/find-career/reality-check>).

Vocational Assessment

- Evaluate skills, interests, and abilities for suitable employment opportunities. In NC, students with disabilities can begin Pre-Employment Transition Services as early as 14 years of age: (<https://www.ncdhhs.gov/divisions/employment-and-independence-people-disabilities/jobseeker-services/youth-and-student-services>).
- Access comprehensive evaluations from the North Carolina Division of Employment and Independence for People with Disabilities (NCEIPD) (<https://www.ncdhhs.gov/eipd>).

Supported Employment



Get assistance in securing and maintaining competitive employment. Benefit from job placement, on-the-job training, and continuous support.

Seek services from Vaya Health (www.vayahealth.com) and NCEIPD through WorkSource West (<https://www.ncdhhs.gov/divisions/eipd/community-rehabilitation-services/worksouce-west>).

Job Coaching



Receive individualized support for job success.

Get help with task learning, workplace accommodations, and communication strategies through the Job Accommodation Network (<https://askjan.org/info-by-role.cfm#for-individuals>).

Post Secondary Vocational Training

The Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE) Process




Call your local EIPD office (<https://www.ncdhhs.gov/eipd>) to set up an intake appointment. In Western North Carolina that number is 828-608-5690. And watch this amazing video series on the process put out by the NCBCE: <https://youtu.be/xs2zzy2MxvA?feature=shared>



At your intake appointment, bring your right to work papers, documentation of your disability, and verification of your identity.



The EIPD will determine your eligibility within 60 days, unless there are extenuating circumstances.



Complete assessments to determine how your disability might affect employment, your skills, and your likes and dislikes.



Develop an Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE) within 90 days of being found eligible.

EMPLOYMENT CHECKLIST



DOCUMENTS

- State issued photo ID
- Employment Certificate if 14-17 yrs
- Employment forms from employer
(tax forms, work eligibility, etc.)
- Social Security number

INTERVIEW

- Copy of your resume
- Work samples (if necessary)
- Transition portfolio
- Specific accommodations list
(employer can only ask after job
offer)
- Name/contact for EIPD counselor
- Questions for employer about job
- Appropriate clothing and
appearance

STARTING YOUR JOB

- Bank account
- Personal email
- Calendar (digital or paper)
- Watch
- Alarm clock
- Driver's license (if have one)
- Transportation plan
- Lunch/drink/snack
- Money
- Emergency contact info

PREPARING FOR WORK

- Have a good transition plan
- Participate in Pre-ETS
- Participate in job shadowing, intern,
apprentice, volunteer
- Job fairs
- Know your rights under the ADA

SUPPORT PEOPLE

- Guidance counselor and IEP Team
- EIPD Counselor/Job Coach
- Family/Friends
